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High Fidelity: Thank God for David Sadof

THANK GOD HE'S BACK: **DAVID SADOV** - "High Fidelity"

I listened to David Sadov back in the days of 103.7 FM The Rocket. At the time, I was thrilled that obscure music was making it to commercial airwaves because I didn't want to be the only freak in Vinal Edge poring through the records and cassette tapes looking for Nick Cave and The B-52s, occasionally stumbling upon the obscure Bill Nelson cd or a cool Lydia Lunch-Henry Rollins spoken word compilation on a likely out of print cassette compilation.

It wasn't until recently that I finally got to meet the man behind the voice with all the knowledge of the obscure and an interest in music that rivaled my own, only to discover (*laughs*) that we went to the same university. Sadov wrote for the Public News in 1981-82. (*The Houston Press acquired Public News in 1998 after 837 weeks of publication.*) It was a tragic loss to music lovers in Houston when that publication ceased to exist. Like myself, he was a Program Director, Music Director and DJ for Sam Houston State University's 90.5 college radio station.

He was also Music Director for KLOL, where he created Exposure, a non-traditional radio show introducing then obscure bands like Nirvana, Smashing Pumpkins, and Pearl Jam. Sadov was also responsible for great radio shows like What the Hell is This? and Lunar Rotation as heard on 107.5 The Rocket which became "The Buzz" before 94.5 "The Buzz" changed frequencies. Introducing new music on the

airwaves that wasn't the top 40 single at the top of every OTHER hour on the radio was a daring move. The successful radio stations were playing the same tracks and Sadov provided a refreshing and nostalgic format for musicphiles. His show was one of the few listeners would look forward to, one you'd likely grab a cassette tape and record because you'd want to hear it again.

"All the specialty shows I have done have one thing in common: they are all in the spirit of early '70s free-form FM radio. In the early years of FM Album Rock Radio, listeners would have favorite DJs based on that DJ's choice of music. You could tell who was on the air based on what they were playing. Hopefully, whenever you hear *Marquee Moon* followed by *Teenage Riot*, you will know that I'm on the air."

Sadov left radio in 1998 when 107.5 FM was sold for the sixth time in two years. I can't say I blame him. Radio is one of those businesses where formats can change and everyone in the station is fired. Sadov returned to Houston radio in June 2005, launching a show called "High Fidelity" on 97.5 FM KFNC, a news/talk radio station. David Sadov was probably the only deejay in Houston that managed to play Ani DiFranco on commercial radio...and we thank him. ∞

Buzzfest has grown so much in the last ten years, Minute Maid Park is housing the event. When I heard last Friday that Buzzfest had been cancelled, I started to freak out. Straight from the **Buzzfest.com** website, I discovered —


"Buzzfest 2005 has been canceled due to scheduling conflicts. This news comes later than we would prefer, but we delayed this decision, only, until we were absolutely satisfied that we had exhausted all options."

What I failed to notice was the lineup and the city. It's disappointing when any festival is cancelled, especially when a lot of venues start planning the next year's festival a year in advance. But, in case you

are wondering, Buzzfest—Nashville was cancelled and **Houston's Buzzfest is still ON**. I spoke to NTR Director for Clear Channel, Maggie Wessel and she assured that she show would go on, even if she had to "get onstage and bang the drums" herself. Thanks, Mags, for the reassurance. Sorry, Nashville, but I'm glad it wasn't Houston. Tickets remain for Buzzfest and you can get them at the TicketMaster, www.ticketmaster.com. ●



ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

The IBC adheres to the following criteria for what constitutes a band and what constitutes a solo/duo act.

Band- any act with three or more musicians. Vocalists are counted as musicians for the purpose of this competition. Both electric and acoustic instruments are allowed.

Solo/Duo- any act with one or two musicians. Vocalists are counted as musicians for the purpose of this competition. Both electric and acoustic instruments are allowed.

GUIDELINES FOR AFFILIATES:

1. Each of The Blues Foundation's 135 Affiliated Organizations has

the right (but not the obligation) to enter a contestant in the IBC. (If your society is not an affiliate, contact Jay Sieleman at jay@blues.org).

2. An Affiliate's representative may be chosen by any means the organization sees fit, whether through a regional competition (recommended) or by appointment.

3. Each Affiliate may enter a Band in the Band Division AND a Solo/Duo act in the Solo/Duo Division to compete in the 22nd IBC in 2006.

4. If the Band and/or Solo/Duo act is appointed rather than selected through a regional competition, the Affiliate must demonstrate through official organization meeting minutes that the organization has adopted this band and/or this solo/duo act as its official representative(s).

5. An Affiliate's entrant is considered a representative of that Affiliate in every capacity. Thus, the Affiliate remains liable for any problems created by its representative.

6. All paperwork, as well as findings of eligibility and registration requirements for IBC are the responsibility of the Affiliate, NOT THE ENTRANT.



IBC (cont)

7. The Blues Foundation will stand as the final arbiter of any eligibility disputes. All contestants will have to have a copy of the affidavit on file with The Blues Foundation before competing in IBC. Any Band found at any time to have been ineligible at the time of the competition will be stripped of its award(s) and the Affiliate may be liable for financial restitution of cash and other prizes to The Blues Foundation.

Restrictions:

--Any artist whose name has ap-

peared on a final Handy ballot is ineligible. All other musicians who have had peripheral and/or professional contact through performance with a Handy nominee, including but not limited to touring band members and studio musicians, are deemed eligible for the IBC

--An individual may not compete in more than one act in any capacity.

--A musician cannot compete in the Band Division and the Solo/Duo Division, even if that musician represents a different Affiliate in each.

No other entry restrictions apply. This means that management contracts,

booking agent contracts, recording contracts, performance contracts (even those that include regular television or radio broadcast) and nationally distributed recordings have no bearing on eligibility. •



Info: I must admit, I've only been to this venue a few times. I saw **Built to Spill** and **Gillian Welch and David Rawlings** there, both incredible shows. Beware of parking on the street near there. I got a ticket for \$65 the night I saw **Hot Hot Heat**. They get some great acts, but you have to get their early to get a seat, otherwise it's standing room only. I'm beginning to wonder if I'm getting to old to go to the standing room shows...

Info: I've never seen a band play here, but they do have that modern jukebox that lets you download music, although you might have to wait awhile to hear your song. The crowd is pretty casual and it's a fun place to bring a group of people to park it upstairs to play pool or lounge in the TV (room which is likely showing a game). Downstairs offers jazz music and a lounge-y atmosphere. I've not hung around the downstairs bar long enough to view the crowd. I usually head upstairs. It hasn't been overcrowded the last several times I've visited. It's a worthy hangout for those that aren't looking to chill at some of the meat market venues in Houston.

MCGONIGEL'S MUCKY DUCK:

Info: Mucky Duck brings Houston some really great artists. The brie is fantastic, but seating is often limited. They book the Asylum Street Spankers which is usually is the reason for me to the venue. Shows range anywhere from free to \$15-20. They don't let you buy tickets over the phone, which is kind of unnerving to have to drive to the venue just to buy tickets, especially when the Spankers are playing because their shows sellout quickly. Great venue for acoustic shows.

Info: I've seen some awesome shows there in the last year. I think the Red Bull is overpriced and now they offer house wines. The Red Room has great atmosphere and a small dance floor, but way too dark for any press to come in and take photos. The room in the back is open and usually saved for larger national acts. The back room has two large bars and a VIP section which is nice when you want to get away from the crowds. I'm glad they host some festivals there such as the Celtic Festival and the Art Car Ball. Parking is decent; however I've paid as much as \$10 to park which can be a little much. Great place to catch some underground shows.

General Info: 21+ only. It's a pretty small place. Parking: Across the street, very limited and around the neighborhood on the streets if you're cool with that. They've booked some bands like Brian Jonestown Massacre, Asylum Street Spankers, Drums & Tuba. It's a great place for a burger and a beer. The only unfortunate thing is some of the patrons that aren't there for the show get a little loud.

METEOR:

INFO: It's pretty much a gay bar, but they have a mixed crowd on the weekends. Meteor offers Drag Queen Bingo and Professional Men/Women's Nights. DJ Joe Zapien plays some great music and there are video screens that show hot dance videos and the occasional Astros game on a slow night. Drinks can get pricey, but the bartenders are great. ∞

Music Stores that are still worth a damn...

Vinal Edge—These guys rock me. They have great clearance. I've bought some treasures there. Good for finding the obscure, the avant garde, the experimental. Great for posters and promotional stuff.

MusicTown—I haven't been by in awhile, but owner Brian May has always been really cool. Love their clearance section. You can sometimes find some hidden treasures here, like Box Sets. I love that he still uses those OLD cd case holders.

Cactus- This store is usually hit and miss for me. I love their novelty section and their movie selection is pretty cool. I like that they support local acts (catch DropTrio's cd release event on the 22nd) and they have that postcard promo tower in the front of their store so bands can still promote their shows.

Movie Trading Company-You may have to scour, but you can find some really great deals on used cds and movies here. It's a chain, so you can find them scattered around the city.

Soundwaves—for some reason, Soundwaves Surf Shop is where it's heading. I'm devastated, but if you dig, sometimes you can find some great stuff in the USED section...∞
